Big clean-up of chewing gum

STORRINGTON will take the blue ribbon for community action next month with its 'Storrington Spring Clean' of the High Street, and adjoining shopping areas.

The Storrington Traders' Association has agreed, in the absence of any available council funding, to beg, borrow or bring their own steam cleaners to town on Sunday March 11.

They will clean the pavements and shop fronts until they gleam. Chewing-gum is a particular problem in shopping areas, and the clean-up crew will be making it their number one job to remove the increasingly ugly gum-pads from the paving slabs.

Storrington Round Table, Fire Brigade, In-My-Town, schools and other local volunteer groups will be providing additional manpower on the day.

But the main credit for this impressive community action must be given to members of the Storrington Traders' Breakfast Club, which meets regularly at The Moon Pub in Storrington High Street.

Kym hoping a touch of vintage class will help to jog memories

A LYRICIST who works with elderly people is using her musical talents to help stimulate their memories and restore their confidence.

Kym Veale, 43, tours local care homes with her scheme 'The Vintage Radio Years' - a project which jogs the memory of the elderly through lyrics and music.

She helps patients with Alzheimers and dementia to remember their 'golden years' through her programme.

Over the years she has been amazed at the positive reaction from those she works with, which she says is down to the inspiration of the music from the 30s, 40s and

50s she plays. "I have seen lots of wonderful things happen," she said.

"When I finish each show everybody is smiling and their confidence has been restored. It draws people out of themselves. The biggest reward at the end of the day is knowing I have made a positive difference."

Kym started the project around ten years ago as a pilot scheme, after being inspired by a project by Horsham Arts Centre. She explained: "I just felt the music was such a powerful way of sparking off memories in the elderly and this has been proven time and time again."

In her show, she recites verses with hidden artists in each, this helps recall memory, followed by the presentation of a popular piece of music. Homes she attends include Hillside Lodge in Pulborough and The Royal Air Force Association in Storrington, (Sussexdown) as well as a number of others across the county. The songs hail from the 1930's, '40s and '50s eras, and include music by the greats such as Dame Gracie Fields, Dame Vera Lynn, Billy Cotton and Glenn Miller.

"They never seem to forget the songs," she said. "While I have been doing this I have seen our music legends run through the hearts of our people here, and witnessed the hope this has continued to bring to their lives."

She says homage to BBC's Henry Hall and other 1930's performers has become central to the mental health and well being of elderly pa-

tients. memories and reconnects patients to the world around them.

The Vintage Radio Years sets the scene 'back in time' with Royal Air Force costume, an authentic wireless and a 1950's microphone. Following a small introduction, she starts the programme with a verse, one of four recited out to a group of elderly patients, referring to a hidden 'guest', a famous vocalist, bandleader or comedian from the 1930's and the titles of their famous songs, lyrics and catchphrases to help prompt their memories. This creates a platform for the first song to be presented and immediately refocuses the minds of her audiences.

"Over the last few years I have loved working with the elderly and my only aim has been to help them with this unique programme."

"But along my path I have heard whispers that many of our elderly feel they have been forgotten, hence my desire to bring back a family-themed show full of the wonderful array of variety from yesteryear, where all can share in the encouraging words of love and hope these songs gave them and often rely on."

She says she has witnessed patients that don't usually speak, or find it difficult to string a sentence together, or in some cases are physically challenged to move, react to the rhythm, melodies, and lyrics of the music, singing along as they would have done years ago.

Her research has shown that this

music has been retained in people's memories and that within a short time they can be transported back to a place in their mind.

But she believes even more can be done for the future. "We need a new generation of truly talented experienced musicians and songwriters within the creative arts with a heart and vision for 2012 to use their gifts for the greater good."

"I believe this music holds a key that could potentially help us understand and develop the foundation to help heal and rehabilitate mental health patients into the future," she added.
